

LOCAL WEDDING
HOLT-STAINER

At All Saints' Parish Church on Thursday, the marriage was solemnised of Mr. **Frederick B. HOLT**, and son of Mr. Richard HOLT, of Middleton, Monkton-street, Ryde, and Miss **Florence C. STAINER**, younger daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George H. STAINER, of High-street, Ryde. Both are well known in the town, Miss STAINER, by her connection with the Ryde Amateur Dramatic Society, being especially so, and as a result the church was practically filled at 12.30, the time of the service. The Vicar of Ryde, the Rev. Hugh LE FLEMING, officiated.

The bride, who entered the church on the arm of her brother, was charmingly attired in a dress of white crepe de chine, mounted on white silk, and embroidered with white silk roses, and trimmed with chiffon and orange blossom, with which was worn a tulle veil and wreath of orange blossom. Her ornaments were a long pearl rope and pearl ear-rings, and she carried a beautiful bouquet of white roses and white carnations, the gift of the bridegroom.
