## MR. A. J. TAYLOR

Proprietor of one of the oldest established business in the town, **Mr. Abraham James TAYLOR,** of "Glendower," 13 Monkton Street, Ryde, died at his home on Saturday, aged 60.

Mr. TAYLOR was a native of Ryde and except for army service in the first world war, lived all his life in the town.

Mr. TAYLOR owned a garage in Monkton Street, where he had worked since leaving school. The business was founded by his grandfather over a century ago as a "posting establishment" for horses, and was carried on by his father, the late Mr. W. R. TAYLOR, who was a prominent public figure, being a Liberal county councillor and Justice of the Peace.

Prior to the first world war Mr. TAYLOR was a member of the Hampshire Yeomanry and during World War I served as a commissioned officer in France and Germany with the Hampshire Regiment. In the recent war he was Ryde Area A.R.P. Transport Officer.

He was a member of the Ryde Businessmen's Association and Ryde Sports Club. A widow, two sons and a daughter survive him.

The Rev. S. G. F. PHILLIPS (minister) conducted the funeral service at the Ryde Congregational Church on Tuesday.
