LIND, JAMES-PLAYER, Esq. of Corstorphine Lodge, Ryde, Isle of Wight, J.P., of Wadham Coll. Oxford, M.A. 1816, M.D. 1819, b. 16 Sept. 1790; m. 17 Oct. 1822, Mary-Anne, dau. of William Reeks, Esq. of Bourne, Sussex.

LINEAGE – The surname of Lynne was assumed by the propietors of the lands and barony of Lynne, in Ayrshire, as soon as surnames became hereditary in Scotland. WALTER DE LYNNE obtained a grant of the lands of Pitmadie in Perthshire, from King ALEXANDER II, A.D. 1244. From Lynne of Ayshire descended,

JAMES LIND, M.D., b. In Edinburgh, in 1716, so well known for his medical works, especially his treatise on the scurvy, and his discovery of the mode of procuring fresh water at sea by distillation. He m. Isabel, dau. of John Dickie, Esq. of Corstorphine Hill, accountant-general of the excise in Scotland, and d. in 1794, leaving two sons and one dau.,

JOHN, of whom we treat James (Sir), K.C.B., captain R.N. Margaret, who m. Dr. Thomas Meek.

The elder son,

JOHN LIND, Esq., M.D. b. 1751; m. 1789, Elizabeth-Lydia, dau. of William Player, Esq. of Ryde, Isle of Wight, and sister and co-heiress of George Player, Esq. of Ryde and had surviving issue.

JAMES PLAYER, of Corstorphine Lodge Elizabeth, *m.* 18??, to Jean Beat Albert du Thon, lieut. Colonel, Lausanne, Switzerland; since deceased. Anne.

Arms – Gu, two lances or spears, in saltier, betwixt a mullet, in chief, and a crescent, in base, arg., all within a border of the last, charges with four fleur-de-lis, and as many amulets, alternately, ar.

Crest – Two laurel-branches, in salier, ppr.

Motto – Semper virescit virtus

Seat – Corstorphine Lodge, Ryde, Isle of Wight.
