

YOUNG WOMAN'S DEATH –

Sincere sympathy is felt with Mr. Kenneth B.RAYNER, of 8 Well-street, in the death, which occurred at Longford House, Havenstreet, on Sunday, of his wife, Mrs. **Theresa Elsie RAYNER**, who was only 34. She had been in indifferent health for some years, but the illness took a serious turn a fortnight ago, and she was removed to Longford House. She was the eldest daughter of Mrs. JACOBS, of 10 St. John's-road, and the late Mr. C.JACOBS, who was killed in the first world war. She was married in 1940 and leaves a daughter age six. Mrs. RAYNER was formerly a member of the choir of the Congregational Church, had sung in productions by the Philharmonic Society, and had competed in the I.W. Musical Festival with considerable success. She was one of the first local officers of the Girl's Life Brigade. The Rev. S.G.F.PHILLIPS (Congregational minister) conducted a service at the cremation at Southampton on Wednesday. Those present were Mr. K.B.RAYNER (husband), Mrs. C.JACOBS (mother), Messrs. C. and R. JACOBS (brothers), Mr. and Mrs. W. CANNING (brother-in-law and sister), Messrs. S. and R. RAYNER (brothers-in-law), Mrs. R.WATTON (aunt), Mr. and Mrs. A.PECKHAM and Mr. and Mrs. G.BOURNE (uncles and aunts), Mrs. H.BROWN and Mr. and Mrs. H.TUTTON. Among the floral tributes was a token from past and present officers of the 1st Ryde Company of the Girl's Life Brigade. The ashes will be scattered in Ryde Cemetery on the grave of Mrs. RAYNER's grandfather (Mr. George BOURNE), who died a few months ago.
