DEATH OF MRS. E.W. CRADOCK

We greatly regret to record the death at Southover Hall, Burwash, Sussex, of Mrs. **CRADOCK**, wife of Col. E.W. CRADOCK, formerly the commandant of the Island Volunteers. The deceased lady, who was very popular in the Island, was the daughter of Capt. STANFIELD, of Courtfield, Spencer-road, and niece of the late Mr. C. FORBES, of The Castle, where she and Col. CRADOCK resided for some time after Mr. FORBES's death. Mrs. CRADOCK had been under the care of Dr. BANKS, of Ryde, and after undergoing a serious operation on Sunday, passed away on Monday morning. The interment will take place in Ryde Cemetery at 3.30 to-day (Saturday).

FUNERAL OF MRS. E.W. CRADOCK

The remains of the late Mrs. **CRADOCK**, wife of Col. E.W. CRADOCK, formerly of The Castle, Ryde, were laid to rest amid many evidences of sympathy on Saturday. The funeral cortege left Southover Hall, Burwash, Sussex, on Saturday morning, and walked through the long drive from the mansion to Ticehurst-road, Station, where a special saloon carriage was attached to the London train. From London Bridge the journey was made to Portsmouth Harbour, where a special boat was in waiting. On arrival at Ryde the procession made its way to the Cemetery, where the service was conducted in the chapel, the officiating clergy being the Rev. C. RHODES HALL, B.D., and the Rev. G.L. DAVEY, M.A. The hymns were "Jesu, meek and gentle" and "On the resurrection morning." The interment took place in the family grave-space, the grave being lined with ivy and evergreens. The coffin was of oiled oak, with brass fittings, and an engraved plate, which bore the inscription: "Emily Margaret; dearly beloved wife of Edmund William CRADOCK, died 31st May, 1909."
