## **DEATH OF MR. F.W.PACK**

Death has removed from the town another well-known personality, that of Mr. Frederick William PACK, who passed away on Tuesday morning, at 24 Well-street, after only a few days illness. Mr PACK was out on Saturday, but in the evening was suddenly taken ill and had to be conveyed home. Medical examination proved that he was suffering from pneumonia. He gradually became worse and died as stated. Deceased was 76 years of age. He was the son of the late Mr. Robert PACK, a former well-known tradesman of the town, and spent his early days in Ryde. Eventually he went to South Africa, and for several years was engaged on a large estate, being chiefly concerned in ostrich farming. During this period he was instrumental in the formation of a barrage which enabled the flood water to be utilised for irrigation purposes. Mr. PACK saw service with the South African Yeomanry during the Boer War. On returning from the colony he lived with his sister, Mrs. CARTER, until her sudden death about two years ago, An exceedingly active man for his years, deceased did a considerable amount of walking. Almost every day he visited the pier, and was well-known to regular visitors. During the summer he was a frequent bather. He was a familiar figure at the Conservative Club and the Unionist Club. The funeral took place yesterday (Friday), a service being held at the Parish Church.
