DEATH OF SIR WILLIAM CLIFFORD, BART.

The death of this gentleman at Bournemouth on Monday last is announced. Having lived so long in Ryde there were few gentlemen better known here, and his tall striking figure, always accompanied by his two large hounds, was constantly seen in our streets. The deceased gentleman only succeeded his father, the late Sir Augustus CLIFFORD of Westfield, Ryde, in 1877, and his health has been failing for some time. He left Ryde for Hastings, and then went to Bournemouth. Sir William was the brother of the member for Newport, but the successor to the title is Robert Cavendish Spencer CLIFFORD, a retired Colonel in the Army.

FUNERAL OF SIR WILLIAM CLIFFORD

On Saturday, at 1 oclock, the remains of the late Sir **William Clifford,** BART., which had been brought from Bournemouth, were interred in the Cemetery. The coffin, which was of beautifully polished oak with brass mountings, was taken into the Parish Church, where the first portion of the service was performed by the Rev A. POOLE. The funeral cortege, consisting of a hearse, four mourning and several private carriages, then wending its way to the cemetery, where the coffin (which was covered with wreaths and crosses of the choicest flowers) was lowered into its last resting place. The chief mourners were Col Sir R. CLIFFORD, C. C. CLIFFORD, Esq., M.P., and the Misses CLIFFORD (2); the servants also attended.

Amongst the friends who attended to pay a last tribute of respect were, the Mayor (B. BARROWS Esq.), General Sir Samuel BROWNE, V.C., General JEFFREYS, J.P., C.B., Rev R. H.E.WIX, Admiral KATON, J.P., Admiral Sir W. LORING, J.P., Colonel ATHERLEY, J.P., Major LEEDS, J.P., C. CAVENDISH, Esq., R.C. WELLESLEY, Esq., &c., &c.
