## DEATH OF A FORMER RESIDENT. A Mutiny Veteran

Formerly a well-known figure in Ryde Colonel **Malcolm FURLONG** passed away at Bournemouth on Tuesday last in his 92<sup>nd</sup> year. He was one of the last officers who served right through the Indian Mutiny. He came to live at Ryde at Selwyn House, High Park- road, about 30 years ago, after which he went to Ealing for a short period, and then returned to Woodstock, Pellhurst-road, where he lived for over 20 years. He left Ryde some seven years ago for Boulogne, and his last visit here was about two years ago, since when he has been at Bournemouth. He was a very familiar figure and was often to be seen riding a tricycle about town, of the charitable associations of which he was a generous supporter. His sister is Mrs. F.L. STEPHENSON of Wilton Grange, Ryde.

Born on August 11<sup>th</sup> 1839, he was the second son of the Rev. C.J. FURLONG, vicar of Warfield, Berks . Malcolm FURLONG was intended for the Indian Civil Service, but being too young to enter for the last examination at Haileybury before the establishment of open competition, was consoled with a cadetship in the Army of the Honourable East India Company. Leaving England at the beginning of 1857, he landed at Madras on February 10<sup>th</sup>. On the outbreak of the Mutiny in May he was gazetted to the 47<sup>th</sup> Madras Infantry, then stationed at Bellary, in the Southern Mahretta country. He was successful in raising the first volunteer corps in Burma, retaining command of it for 13 years. FURLONG retired from the service on a colonel's pension. He married a daughter of Lieutenant-Colonel STEPHENSON, an officer of the 17<sup>th</sup> Lancers, who was in the Balaclava charge, and they had five children.

The remains were brought from Bournemouth to Ryde, on Friday for interment in a grave by the side of that of his wife. A service was first held in the Parish Church, conducted by the Vicar (Canon G.A. JOHNSTONE). The mourners were Mr. and Mrs. J. MOODY-STUART (son-in-law and daughter), Miss PRENDERGAST (representing Mrs. F.L. STEPHENSON, a sister), and Mr. MORGAN (nurse). Among others present were Mr. and Mrs. R.B. WATTS, Mr. H. WRIGHT and Mrs. FITZGERALD.
