DEATH OF MR. OLIVER JOHN BUTLER

The establishment from which this journal was issued, was again visited by death on Sunday last, and its proprietress has now lost her youngest and only remaining son, Mr. Oliver John BUTLER, scarcely a month after the death of his brother. Like his brother, Mr. Oliver BUTLER, was for some time a pupil of Mr. R.J. JONES, the well-known architect, of this town and displayed considerable ability for so youthful a student, he was only 18 years of age when he died. His long and tedious illness was borne hopefully and patiently, and his death was a calm and happy one. For Mrs. BUTLER, who has been thus bereaved of so many of those nearest to her, nothing can be felt but the deepest sympathy. The funeral took place on Thursday. The coffin was conveyed to St. Michael's Church, at Swanmore, of which deceased was a member. It was received by the west door by the clergy, acolytes and choir, who proceeded to the chancel gates, chanting the appointed psalm. The office appointed for the dead having been gone through there, was a celebration of the

Holy Communion; after which the procession re-formed, and wended its way to the cemetery, where the concluding part of the service was performed by the Rev. HOOKER WIX.
