DEATH OF CAPT R. C. WELLESLEY, R.A.

We regret to announce the death of Capt. **Richard Colley WELLESLEY**, only son of Col. WELLESLEY, of Ryde, which occurred at Sheerness on Monday. Deceased, who was only 31 years of age, was on General WESTMACOTT's staff and served as orderly officer during both campaigns in the Mohmund and Tirah countries last autumn, being mentioned in despatches. The medals and clasps of these wars only reached his relatives on Tuesday. He was invalided home through fever, and it was a recurrence of this illness which ended fatally. The remains, encased in lead, with an outer coffin of polished oak, left Sheerness on Wednesday morning. Full military honours were paid to the deceased by the troops in garrison, many naval officers also attending. The body, on reaching Ryde at 8 in the evening was taken direct to St. Mary's (Roman Catholic) Church. On Thursday morning a requiem mass was said by the Very Rev. Monsignor Provost CAHILL. The coffin was covered with the Union Jack as a pall and on it were the deceased's sword and helmet. A party of men from the Royal Artillery, Portsmouth attended as bearers, under the command of Lieut. LANGTON.

The chief mourners were Mrs. WELLESLEY (widow) and Col. and Mrs. WELLESLEY (father and mother). There were also present Col. CRADOCK, Col. FETHERSTONHAUGH, Capt. COLLINS, Mr. A. H. TATNALL, Col. CAREY, Capt. Ronald ALEXANDER. With Monsignor CAHILL was the Rev. Father CUNER.

Floral tributes of a very lovely character came from the officers of the Artillery at Sheerness, Sir Samuel and Lady BROWNE, Mrs. Augustus F.
