DEATH OF ADMIRAL DICKSON

It is with regret that we this week have to record that Admiral **DICKSON** (brother of Sir Collingwood DICKSON, Bart), died at his residence, "Thornbrough," Ryde, on Friday morning. His illness was of a few weeks' duration, but during the greater part of that time his condition was critical that but little hope of his recovery was entertained. The deceased entered the Royal Navy 1834, became Lieutenant in 1839; appointed to the Melville and served through a portion of war in China; served in the Warspite, 50 guns, on Mediterranean station, and in the Queen on the Home station; became a Commander 1847, and subsequently Rear-Admiral; served in the Caledonia; commanded the Brittania in the Russian War; promoted for the attack on Odessa, 1854; served as Capt. in the Cumberland, with Sir P.W.P. WALLIS, and afterwards in the Trafalgar, Dauntless, Irresistible, and Orlando; had a good service pension, the Chinese medal, and the Order of the Mejidie.

THE LATE ADMIRAL DICKSON, C.B.

It was with sincere regret we recorded, last week, the death of Rear-Admiral John **Bourmaster DICKSON,** of Thornbrough, but we had not time to give particulars, which we now supply. The deceased Admiral, who was in his 61st year, was fifth son of Rear-Admiral Sir Archibald Collingwood DICKSON, Bart, and brother of the late Sir William DICKSON and of the present baronet, Sir Alexander Collingwood DICKSON, and heir presumptive to the baronetsy. He went to sea young, and obtained a lieutenancy in 1839 in the Melville, 72, Capt. the Hon Richard S. DUNDAS, under whom he served throughout a portion of the war in China. He was at the capture of the forts of the Bocca Tigriss and in the operations against Canton, and was also at the taking of Chusan in 1841. He afterwards served under the present Admiral of the Fleet, Sir Provo WALLIS, in the Warspite on the Mediterranean station, and afterwards under Capt Henry John LOCKE, in the Queen, on the home station. He became a commander in 1847. During the Russian war he greatly distinguished himself. He was a commander of the Brittania in the Mediterranean fleet, and in charge of the rocket boats at the bombardment of Odessa for which he received gazetted promotion in 1854. He was last appointed in 1862 to the Dauntless Coastguard, and became Rear-Admiral on the retired list in 1870. The deceased Admiral was always popular with those he commanded, and was twice thanked by the Royal Humane Society for saving the lives of men who had fallen overboard. He was decorated with the order of the Medjidie of the Fourth Class, and was nominated a Companion of the Bath in 1871.

The funeral of the late Admiral took place on Wednesday, at the Ryde Cemetery, the Rev.

Alex. POOLE officiating. The massive coffin, of polished oak, with brass handles, was covered with the British Union Jack of the Royal Navy for a pall. It must be taken as a mark of the very high esteem in which the gallant Admiral was held that a large number of gentlemen, resident in Ryde and its neighbourhood, voluntarily assembled at the Cemetery to take part in the funeral service, Admiral KATON, Capt. TATTNALL, Capt. MENZIES, and Capt. BOGER, all of the Royal Navy, acting as pall-bearers. The arrangements were characterised by a studied absence of display.

Messrs. RIDDETT and Son were the undertakers employed.
