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YOUNG ISLAND POLICEMAN KILLED

MAINLAND ROAD ACCIDENT.

P.C. Herbert Sidney DEAN, of 10a Union Street, Ryde, who was formerly manager of the Medina Cinema, Newport, received fatal injuries in a road accident on the mainland on Monday. He joined the Hampshire Constabulary six weeks ago and was returning from his first week-end leave by motor-cycle to Falfield, Gloucestershire, where he was studying at a police school. At Chipping Sodbury, on the Gloucestershire border, he was involved in a collision with a lorry and killed instantaneously. His pillion passenger, a fellow policeman of the Kent Constabulary, to whom he had offered a lift, was seriously injured and taken to hospital. An inquest was opened at Chipping Sodbury on Wednesday and adjourned.

Mr. DEAN was 28 and the only son of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. DEAN, of 24 Hill Street, Ryde. He attended the Upper Grade School, where he showed promise of becoming a fine athlete, playing football and becoming a strong swimmer. At the age of 15 he enlisted in the Island Territorials and was at a summer training camp when war was declared. He went to France with the Royal Artillery in the Expeditionary Force and took part in the Dunkirk epic. After nearly three years in Iceland he spent the remainder of his service at home. A versatile instrumentalist, he ran a dance band before the war, and on returning to Ryde became drummer in the Commodore ballroom band. Two years ago he was appointed assistant manager at the Commodore, and eight months later became manager of the Medina Theatre at Newport. He was responsible for staging musical and comedy items for children on Saturday mornings, and took part himself. Since joining the constabulary he had been stationed at the police headquarters, Winchester.

He was a former popular member of Ryde St. John's F.C., for whom he played centre-forward, and Haylands F.C. The news of his death has come as a severe shock to many local friends, who deeply sympathise with his wife and parents. He leaves a baby daughter. The funeral took place at Ryde Parish Church yesterday (Friday).

The funeral service of Mr. **Herbert Sidney DEAN**, of Union Street, Ryde, whose tragic death was recorded last week, took place at All Saint's Parish Church, the Vicar (Canon A. CORY) officiating.
