The will of General Sir **James Lillyman CALDWELL**, G.C.B., of Beachlands, and of Portland-place, was proved in London by the executors and trustees, namely, Mrs. SULLIVAN, the testator's daughter; Edward Cockburn KINDERLEY, esq.; General DUNCAN-SMITH, E.I.C.; and Charles BAKER esq., of Lincoln's-inn: the personalty being sworn under £120,000. This gallant military officer was a general in the Indian army; served under Lord CORNWALLIS; was present at the two sieges of Seringapatam; and commanded the Engineers at the capture of Mauritius. Sir James attained the advanced age of 93. His will bears date 1858, with two codicils, 1860-62. After making a few bequests to relatives and some personal friends, the testator leaves to his daughter and executrix, Mrs. SULLIVAN, a life interest in the sum of £50,000; and, upon her decease bequeaths £20,000 to her daughter (the testator's granddaughter), Lady LEES; and £30,000 amongst his great-grandchildren, the six children of Sir John and Lady LEES, being £5,000 to each; and appoints his said daughter, Mrs. SULLIVAN, residuary legatee.

A chaste monument to the memory of Sir James has been erected, by ELLERY of Ryde, over the vault in the Cemetery. It is an horizontal cross in Caen stone, flanked by six field pieces, connected with a chain festooned, and bearing a modest inscription, setting forth details similar to those above.
