THE LATE COMMANDER LESLIE

The funeral took place at the Cemetery on Saturday of the late Commander **M. B. LESLIE** late RN of "Dar Diaf", Dover-street, who passed away in a private ward at the County Hospital on Thursday at the comparatively early age of 43. He was the son of Sir John and Lady LESLIE, of Nairn, Scotland, and was in command of a monitor, which was torpedoed in action during the war. After relinquishing active serve, through ill-health, was appointed Chief Coastguard Officer at Ventnor, a post which he had until 18 months ago when he took up his residence in Ryde. He had previously applied for his discharge, owing to indifferent health, and this was to have taken effect from April 1 of this year. During last summer he underwent an operation in London for appendicitis, and a fortnight ago was removed to the County Hospital for another operation, but never recovered from a long and painful illness.

The funeral was a simple one but Mr. Charles LANGDON the undertaker had the chapel in the cemetery laid with carpet and there were also some nice flowers. The Vicar of Holy Trinity (Rev. Noel H. STUBBS) officiated.
