DEATH AT HAZELWOOD

A young man named **GOODMAN** who was staying at the Hazelwood "Home of Rest and Recreation," died under sad and very melancholy circumstances last week. It appears that Mr. GOODMAN was suffering from acute lung disease, and was staying at Hazelwood, for the benefit of his health. He was comparatively well on Monday, and a corpse on Tuesday, being found dead in his bed about mid-day. Though thus very sudden and unexpected, his death was quite a natural one, and Dr. Channing NIELL was able to give a certificate without the formality of an inquest.

The deceased gentleman was a Roman Catholic in religion, and was buried in accordance of the rites of the Romish Church on Saturday. He had no friends in England, his family we believe being in America. The suddenness of Mr. GOODMAN's death was rendered more startling from the fact that the day before his demise he dined with the rest of the inmates of the Home, and ate quite a hearty meal. Hæmorrhage of the lungs is understood to have been the immediate cause of death.
