### FUNERAL OF MR. H. E. BROWN

The funeral took place on Tuesday morning of Mr. **H. E. BROWN**, of High Street, a well known and highly respected townsman. Deceased who had enjoyed excellent health up to quite recently, was 82 years of age, for quite half of which period he filled the position of verger at St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church. Here the first part of the very impressive burial service was held, and was taken part in by the Right Rev Bishop COTTER and Canon MONGAN; the Requiem Mass being sung by the latter, who assisted by two priests, carried out the last solemn rites at the

graveside. There was a large and sympathetic congregation present at the Church, and many followed the remains to the Cemetery. Among the floral tributes was a lovely cross sent by the congregation which covered the entire length of the coffin.
