A PERSIA VICTIM

Mr. **Wilfred Herbert RIGG**, who is reported as among those lost by the torpedoing of the s.s. Persia on the 30th ult., was the second son of the late Rev. Edmund RIGG and Mrs RIGG, Ingle Nook, Queens-road. He was a mining engineer and was cabled back to England from India by his firm. He left Ryde on Dec. 17th and sailed from London on the Persia on the following day. His destination was Tavoy, Burma, where he was going to mine Wolfram, which mineral plays a very important part in the production of munitions. The mails brought letters from Gibraltar, Malta, and Marseilles, and the first intimation Mrs. RIGG received that the Persia had been torpedoed was supplied by a *County Press* telegram. The deceased, who was 38 years of age, was born in Ceylon and had been engaged in mining at Brazil, Portugal, South India, and previously at Tavoy. He had been abroad most of his life, but was fairly well known in the town. His father, a Wesleyan minister, did 25 years missionary work in Ceylon, worked for four years in Germany under the German Wesleyan Mission, and was once minister at the Wesleyan Church in this town.
