### **THE LATE CAPT. FAIRALL**

We regret to announce the death of another old resident in the person of Capt. **James Iles FAIRALL**, at the age of 84. The deceased who was a native of the town, and was for many years well-known as the licensee of the Vine Inn, Castle-Street, died on Thursday week, following a seizure on the previous Saturday. He was a master in the Mercantile Marine, and was initiated a Freemason at Newcastle. The Mayor (Mr. Rowland RUSSELL, J.P.) attended the funeral on Monday, the service being conducted at Holy Trinity Church by the Vicar (the Rev. N.H. STUBBS). Among the family mourners were Mrs. COOPER, Miss E. FAIRALL, and Miss K. FAIRALL (daughters).
