FUNERAL OF MR JOHN WILSON FARDELL

The funeral of the late Mr **John Wilson FARDELL**, lately Clerk to the IW County Council, took place at the Ryde Cemetery on Saturday amid many tokens of respect. The body, which was conveyed on an open hearse, was covered with floral tributes, others being continued in a waggonette. The first part of the service took place in Holy Trinity Church. The body was met by the choir and the following clergy:- The Revs W M CAMERON, K M PITT, H E EWBANK, W H E WELBY, and W G WHITTAM, the first named reading the sentences. The hymn, "Now the labourer's task is o'er", and the 39th psalm were sung. The Rev K M PITT read the lesson. The service at the church closed with the hymn, "On the resurrection morning", sung as a recessional, and "The Dead March" was played by the organist.

The mourners were Messrs J and G FARDELL (sons), F C FARDELL (brother), H PEACOCK (son-in-law), the Rev E BAYLY (brother-in-law), Col. F WOODHOUSE JAMES (cousin), Mr F HORNER, and Mr CANNING (London partner). Amongst those present at the church and graveside were the Mayor (Alderman GROVES), and a great number of public men representing Ryde and the Island generally. The wreaths were very numerous.

Mr John FARDELL made a feeling response to what had been said, and added that he would take for his example the conduct and principles in life shown and taught him by his late father.
