DEATH OF MAJOR JAMES FLUX

We regret to record the death of Major **James FLUX**, the sad event having taken place at the residence of his son (Councillor FLUX, J.P., C.C.) early on Saturday. Deceased had never properly recovered from a serious attack of bronchitis, from which he suffered five years ago. He caught cold recently, and drove in from his country residence on Christmas Day to spend the festival with his son and other members of his family, but became so ill that he had to go to bed in the afternoon. There he gradually grew worse until death supervened. Major FLUX, who was fifty-eight years of age, was Assistant Overseer for the parishes of Ryde and Ashe, and Clerk to the Ryde School Board, which post he had held from the foundation of the Board. He was an ardent Volunteer, having joined the local corps at its formation, and passed through all the ranks. He only severed his active connection with it a few years since, at which time he held the honorary rank of major. He held the long service medal. Since his retirement he has acted as paymaster for the regiment. He did good work on the Highway Commissioners, and in many other capacities rendered the public invaluable services. As an official he was always courteous and competent; indeed, he was thorough in all he undertook. None went to him for advice and assistance in vain where it was in his power to give them. Both as a public servant and as a man his death will create a gap which cannot easily be filled.

The remains of the late Major were interred at the Ryde Cemetery on Wednesday, amidst every token of respect. Colonel CRADOCK, commanding the Island Volunteers, had suggested a military funeral, but the deceased's family did not feel able to accept the offer. There was a large and representative gathering at the graveside. Wreaths and flowers were sent by the School Board, Town Council, Overseers, the teachers and children of the Ryde Town Schools, Havenstreet School, Ashe School, the Ryde Volunteers, and numerous relatives and personal friends.
