DEATH OF ADMIRAL JELLICOE'S MOTHER

While the whole nation sympathises with Sir John JELLICOE in the loss of his mother, the townspeople of Ryde have to express a more intimate sorrow. The death occurred at 2 Northfield, George-Street, on Tuesday night at the great age of 82. The deceased lady survived her husband, Capt. JELLICOE, just over two years; he died in September, 1914, in his 90th year.

The funeral took place yesterday (Friday) afternoon. The service was held at Holy Trinity Church, where the Vicar (the Rev. J.E. EDDIS, R.D.) officiated, assisted by the Rev. N. STUBBS. From the right side of the chancel hung the Union Jack from H.M.S. Iron Duke, the flag ship of Admiral Sir John JELLICOE, presented to Holy Trinity Church by Miss E. JELLICOE, and on the opposite side a pennant, sadly torn by shot and shell, belonging to Submarine E13, on which the Vicar's son was serving when it was stranded off the Danish coast and attacked by the Germans. The surpliced choir attended. The hymns sung were "Jesu, Lover of my soul," "Peace, perfect peace," and "Holy Father, cheer our way." The lesson was read by the Rev. N. STUBBS. The chief mourners were the REV. and Mrs. F.G.G. JELLICOE, Mr. C.E. KEELE, Miss PILKINGTON, Mr. BURNETT, Mrs. John KEELE, Mr. J.R. KEELE, Mr. C. LE FEVRE, Dr. Evelyn RICH, Nurse WOODCOCK, Nurse BURNIE, and the servants of the household. Those present at the church included the Mayor (Cllr. John L. BARTON), Admiral Sir Stanley COLVILLE (commander-inchief at Portsmouth), with his Flag Lieut. A.A. MURRAY, Ald. E. GROVES, J.P., and Messrs. A. LOCKE, E.C. GOBLE, and A.G. PURNELL. The coffin was of unpolished oak, bearing a brass cross, and upon the plate was inscribed "Lucy Henrietta JELLICOE, died 17th October, 1916. Aged 82 years." DEATH OF MRS. JELLICOE

We regret to record the death of Mrs. **JELLICOE**, widow of the late Captain J. H. JELLICOE, and mother of the Admiral of the Grand Fleet, which occurred at Northfield, George-Street, at the advanced age of 82 years, on Tuesday night. The funeral took place on Friday, the service being held at Holy Trinity Church, the Vicar (the Rev. J.E. EDDIS, R.D.) and the Rev. Noel STUBBS, officiating.

The chief Mourners were the Rev. and Mrs. F.G.G. JELLICOE, Mr. C.E. KEELE, Mrs. PILKINGTON, Mr. BURNETT, Mr. John KEELE, Mr. J.R. KEELE, Mr. C. LE FEVRE, Dr. E. RICH, Nurse BURNIE, and the servants of the household. Among those at the church were the Mayor (Mr. John I. BARTON), Ald. E. GROVES, J.P., Mr. A. LOCKE, Mr. A.J. PURNELL, Mr. E.C. GOBLE, Admiral Sir Stanley COVILLE, Commander-in-Chief at Portsmouth Dockyard, with Flag-Lieut. A.A. MURRAY, etc. Mr. A. Percy JAMES presided at the organ and the hymns were "Jesu, lover of my soul," "Peace perfect peace" and "Holy Father, cheer our way." The funeral rites at the graveside were performed by Rev. J.E. EDDIS. The coffin, which was of unpolished oak with large brass cross and the lid, bore the following inscription:
