DEATH OF COLONEL ARCHIBALD W. CLARKE.

We have with unfeigned regret to announce the death of Col. **Archibald W. CLARKE** on Monday morning last, at the age of 76. The deceased gentleman came to live at Thornbrough, Binstead- road, Ryde, many years ago and soon evinced that enthusiastic interest in Island politics which he manifested to the last. He succeeded the late Major A. F. LEEDS as vice-president of the Ryde polling district of the I.W. Conservative Association and was very active in promoting the candidature of the present Lord Chief Justice, then Sir Richard WEBSTER. On the death of Mr. F. WHITE- POPHAM he became president of the I.W. Conservative Association, in which post he found ample scope for his energy. He was always an ardent supporter of the Primrose League and by his enthusiasm and geniality of character he did good work for his party and made many personal friends.

The deceased officer was lieut.-Colonel of the 3rd Battalion South Lancashire Regiment. His corps volunteered for service in the Mediterranean at the period of the Crimean War, and Col. CLARKE was for some time stationed with it at Malta. The deceased officer shared to the full in an Englishman's love of sport. Until his health began to fail he was regularly found out with the I.W. Hunt. For some 10 years he filled the post of president of the Ryde Cricket Club; indeed he only resigned that post at the last annual meeting. The services he rendered to that organisation by frequent attendance at the matches and by promoting its success, especially from a social point of view, were warmly appreciated by the members, who showed their sense of indebtedness by frequently re-electing him. The Isle of Wight Infirmary has lost a true friend by the removal of Col. CLARKE from our midst.

The knell of the Parish-church was tolled on Monday evening on the death becoming known, and the flag at the Royal Victoria Yacht Club, of which deceased was a member, was flown at half mast.

The funeral took place on Thursday morning at Binstead cemetery. Deceased's remains were enclosed in a polished oak coffin with brass furniture, the inscription on the lid being "Archibald William CLARKE, died 20th May, 1901." The interment took place in a brick grave beside that of the deceased's infant son, who died in 1885. The grave was prettily decorated with evergreens, picked out with white iris and lilac, with a cross of arum lilies and other flowers at the head. The Burial Office was said wholly at the graveside by the Rev. C. RHODES HALL, of St. Tomas's, Ryde, which church the gallant officer was wont to attend.
