FUNERAL

On Friday afternoon the mortal remains of the late respected baronet, Sir Alexander Collingwood DICKSON, were interred at the Ryde Cemetery, in the same vault as contain the remains of his beloved wife, whose loss he survived but a comparatively short period. The service at the grave was performed by the Rev. W.M.HARRISON, the chief mourners being Sir John DICKSON-POYNDR (the new baronet), the Rev. W.D.CARTER, the Rev. W.CARTER, Gen. Sir Collingwood DICKSON, G.C.B., V.C., Col. KING, R.A., Alfred H.BURTON, Esq., J.T.CAMPBELL, Esq., and Dr. DAVY, but a large number of the local gentry and tradesmen also testified their respect for one who had so long been a resident in the town by attending at the cemetery on the melancholy occasion. The coffin was an exceedingly handsome one of polished oak with brass handles, &c., and was covered by wreaths of most beautiful flowers. The inscription on the brass plate was as follows: "Sir Alexander Collingwood Thomas DICKSON, R.N., fifth baronet, born August 1st, 1810, died June 22nd, 1884." Messrs. RIDDETT and Son were the undertakers.

We are requested to correct an error into which we and other newspapers fell in regard to the successor of the late Sir Collingwood DICKSON. The deceased baronet is succeeded by his nephew, Mr John Poynder DICKSON-POYNDR, who took the name of POYNDR by licence in addition to that of DICKSON in 1881, and not, as we stated last week, "in lieu" of DICKSON.
