DEATH OF MISS CLIFFORD

We much regret to hear that a telegram has been received in the town this (Friday) morning announcing the death at 18, Warwick-Square, London, of Miss **CLIFFORD**, elder daughter of Sir Augustus and Lady Elizabeth CLIFFORD, of Westfield, Ryde. This intelligence will, we feel sure, be received with general regret and sympathy for the family, locally so respected and well-known, we understand that the remains of the deceased will be brought back to Ryde for interment.

THE FUNERAL OF THE LATE MISS CLIFFORD

The remains of the late Miss **CLIFFORD**, whose death was recorded in our last issue, were brought to Ryde for interment. The first part of the service took place at St. Michael's and All Angels' Swanmore, at noon on Wednesday. The family have always taken an interest in Swanmore Church. Sir Augustus CLIFFORD was a member of the building committee, and there is a window in the church with a memorial to his memory. Miss CLIFFORD was also a great benefactor and supporter of the Church.

The first portion of the Burial Service was most impressively read by the Vicar (the Rev. W. F. J. HANBURY), and Chopin's "Funeral March," was executed by the organist (Miss Margaret FOWLER), at the close. The coffin was then carried to the cemetery, where it was interred.

The mourners were Sir C. CAVENDISH CLIFFORD, Bart, Miss Augusta CLIFFORD, Mrs. Audrey REDESDALE, and the servants. Amongst those also present, Ald. E. MARVIN and J. DASHWOOD, and Mr. W. E. RATCLIFFE. The coffin was of English oak, with brass fittings. A number of splendid wreaths were sent.
