Sudden Death in the Street

Mr. **Albert William URRY** (62), a Ryde born Cardiff shipping accountant, was found dying on a seat in Spencer's Road on Friday night. Passers-by telephoned the police and P.C.'s HODGES and COOK hurried to the scene, accompanied by Dr. T. SIM, but Mr. URRY died from heart-failure shortly after their arrival.

The facts were reported to the Coroner, but an inquest was not deemed necessary.

Mr. URRY, whose mother owned the Waverley Hotel (now part of the Esplanade Hotel), was educated at the Bettesworth-road School, and was for some years a chorister at St. Michael's Church. On leaving school he took an appointment at the Town Hall, but on reaching the age of 20 he left the town and took up residence in Cardiff. For 25 years, until his retirement two years ago, he had been employed as an accountant at the Cardiff office of Messrs. T. T. Pascoe Ltd., a subsiduary of Messrs. Furness, Withy Ltd., the big shipping concern.

He had returned to his native town on holiday a fortnight before his death and had been staying at 80 Monkton-street with his sisters-in-law, the Misses FARMER. His brother, Mr. John URRY, is a leading figure in the London Vectensian Society.

The funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon at the Cemetery when the Rev. H. G. DRAKE (Baptist) officiated. The principal mourners were Mrs. URRY (widow), Mr. and Mrs. W. D. URRY (son and daughter-in-law), Messrs. N.J., and E.E. URRY (sons), Mr. and Mrs. J.E.M. URRY (brother and sister-in-law), Mrs. K. NEAL (sister), Mr. and Mrs. W. FARMER and Mr. and Mrs. A. FARMER (brother-in-law and sister-in-law), Mr. E. FARMER (brother-in-law), The Misses E. and E. FARMER (sisters-in-law), Mr. V.
