THE LATE MR. W. A. BEALE

The late Mr. William Arthur BEALE, the greatly respected and deeply mourned schoolmaster of Binstead, whose death has already been recorded in our columns, was born in Southsea on January 16th 1860. He was educated at Christchurch, Hants, and was trained in Winchester College, passing out of the College with a 1st class. His first school was at Swaffham, Bulbeck, Cambridge, where he remained eight years. He secured the appointment of head teacher at Binstead School in the year 1890, which position he filled with great credit to himself and much benefit to the large number of children who came under his care. As a schoolmaster, friend and parishioner he was greatly beloved, and his very kind and genial manner won for him the greatest respect of all who knew him, which was clearly shown by the large number of friends who attended the funeral on Saturday. His illness when first known in November cast quite a gloom over the village, and it was borne throughout with great patience and Christian fortitude.

The funeral service was conducted by Canon PHILLIPS with much feeling. At the graveside children sang Mr. BEALE's favourite piece "The Glory Song,"
