CAPT. A. N. ANDREWS

Death of Well-Known Gymkhana Judge

Well known judge at Island gymkhana and a former hon secretary of the I.W. Hunt, Capt. **Arthur Newton ANDREWS** of "Southfield," Upton Road, Ryde, died on Thursday at the age of 74. Born in Ryde, Capt. ANDREWS lived in the town all his life, and at the time of his death was Island Income Tax Commissioner.

War Service

During the First World War. Capt. ANDREWS served with the 1st Oxford and Bucks Light Infantry. He was awarded his captaincy while serving in the Island with the Hampshire Territorials during the Second World War. Capt. ANDREWS was president of the Ryde Bristish Legion, and a vice-president and former joint hon. Secretary of the Royal I.W. Agricultural Society. He was a well known ring steward at their annual show at Newport for many years and a skilled judge of light horses.

Mountaineer

Capt. ANDREWS was also chairman and hon. Secretary of the British Association of the Swiss Alpine Club. He was made a director of the Vectis Building Society in 1934 and became vice-chairman in 1942. From 1949 until the time of his death Capt. ANDREWS was chairman of the society. Capt. ANDREWS was the son of Ald. Arthur ANDREWS who served as Mayor of Ryde from 1920 to 1923. He leaves a widow and two daughters.

A service at St. James's Church on Tuesday, conducted by the Incumbent, the Rev. E. E. M. GREEN, preceded interment at Ashey Cemetery. The Ryde Bristish Legion men's and women's section were represented with their flags. Family mourners were: Mrs. A. N. ANDREWS, widow; Miss Megan ANDREWS, daughter; Col. Sir Ambrose and Lady KEEVIL, brother-in-law and sister; Mr. and Mrs. Arthur G. SALMON, cousins; and Miss RENNIE, friend.
