OAKFIELD TRADESMAN'S DEATH

We regret to record the death of a well-known and old established tradesman of Oakfield. Mr. **Alfred COOK** of the Steam Bakery and grocery stores at 37 High-street, which occurred very suddenly on Monday morning. He was working in the stores at the time when he collapsed and died from heart trouble for which he had been attended by Dr. KENNEDY. About twelve months ago he had a very serious attack but the doctor brought him round and his health had lately been fairly good.

The facts were reported to the Coroner but as Dr. KENNEDY was prepared to give a certificate as to the cause of death an inquest was not deemed necessary.

The late Mr. COOK who was much respected in the neighbourhood was born in High-street, Oakfield, and had been established in business since 1886, having formerly occupied the premises at No. 80. He leaves a widow and married daughter (Mrs. HUNT), his son having died in 1903.

Much sympathy has been expressed with the relatives. The funeral takes place at Ryde Cemetery today (Thursday).

OAKFIELD BAKER DROPS DEAD

One of the oldest and most respected tradesmen at Oakfield, Mr. **Alfred COOK**, a baker, of High-street, dropped down dead on Monday morning while actively engaged in his usual occupation. Just after 11 o'clock Mr. COOK was carrying a small tray of cakes from the bakehouse when he was seen by an assistant, Elsie TRUCKELL, to fall heavily. He died immediately.

The facts were reported to the Deputy Coroner, but as the deceased who had suffered from heart disease for some time, had been receiving medical attention, an inquest was not deemed necessary.

Mr. COOK was 61 years of age, and he leaves a widow and one married daughter. He was a prominent local Oddfellow.
