Her Ladyship was the second wife of the late Sir Henry DALY, K.C.B., who saw much service in India, and was one of the County Justices for the Isle of Wight. ## **FUNERAL OF LADY DALY**

We regret to have to report the death of Lady **DALY**, of "St. Wilfred's" near Ryde. Lady DALY having lived the majority of her life in the Island cannot be regarded as a "true Islander." She was a great grand-daughter of Mrs. ARNOLD and daughter of James COAPE, Esq., both of "Mirables," The Undercliff, widow of General Sir Henry DALY, G.C.B., C.I.E., of Ryde House. She was renown both for her popularity and hospitality to both rich and poor; her kindly nature endeared her to all with whom she came in contact; her interests and sympathies were wide embracing a great love of nature in all its forms. In the hunting field both during the time that Sir Henry DALY was master of the I.W. Foxhounds and afterwards Lady DALY was regarded as a sportswoman of the highest order, being one of the best and most foremost riders in the country. During the war she was most helpful in providing for and contributing to, the welfare of the fighting soldier, latterly her attentions were chiefly directed to promoting and stimulating interest in Dr. Barnado's Homes; she organised "workparties" at her house which were largely attended, a great deal of "work" being done and sold for the benefit of the Homes. Our recollections of Lady DALY will always be those of a lady who endeared herself to many, her great personality and her numerous kind acts and words to all around her, and we know how greatly she will be missed by all. Numerous

kind messages of sympathy were received including a telegram from H.R.H. Princess Beatrice.

The interment was at the Cemetery in a grave adjoining that of the late Sir Henry DALY, and which was lined with evergreens. The body was enclosed in an oiled oak coffin with inscription:

## Charlotte Claudine Georgeana DALY Died February 22<sup>nd</sup>, 1920.

The funeral arrangements were entrusted to Mr. Charles LANGDON.

A service was held at All Saints which was largely attended and was conducted by the Vicar (the Rev. Hugh le FLEMING) assisted by Canon SHEARME. The choir were present and led the singing of two hymns, "Lead Kindly Light," and "Sun of my Soul," the choir also rendering Psalm 23, Mr. E. G. WELSH presiding at the organ. The principal mourners were Major Victor DALY (son), Mrs. Colvin STEWART (sister), Mrs. Victor DALY, Col. Sir Hugh DALY, Brig-Gen. A. C.
