An old and prominent resident passed away on Monday in a nursing home at the advanced age of 78 years in the person of Mr. **George BENNETT**, nurseryman, of Pellhurstroad, Ryde. Mr. BENNETT was a stauch Conservative who in his earlier days was an active worker for that cause, and when Sir Richard WEBSTER (who was later Lord Alverstone now deceased) was Member of Parliament for the Island, he was to be seen on the platform expounding his political creed. He was held in great esteem by all who knew him, and for many years he had been a member of the Ryde Conservative Club, also of the Royal Horticultural Society, London. Mr. BENNETT was a Nonconformist and was by his special wish the first part of the funeral service, interment taking place on Thursday afternoon, was conducted by the Rev. DEDAMES at the Wesleyan Chapel in Garfield-road. He was a native of Wiltshire and leaves a widow, one son, three daughters and two grandchildren. There were about thirty floral tributes from the widow and other relatives and friends, including one "With deepest sympathy from the Ryde Conservative Club" and another from Messrs. Wm. NEWTON and Sons, of Covent Garden, London, with whom Mr. BENNETT had business.
