Distress Signal Seen Too Late.- Mr. Charles Frederick BRIND, aged 56, a retired grocer of 58 West Street, was found dead in his home on Sunday by his next door neighbour, Mr. H. GIBBS. Mr. BRIND, who was single, had arranged that he would post a notice in his window when he wanted help, and when Mr. GIBBS saw a notice at lunchtime saying "Please come" he found him dead on a chair in the sitting room. A post mortem showed that death was due to natural causes.

Preceded by a Requiem Mass at which the celebrant was the Rev. T. E. MURPHY, the funeral service took place on Thursday, at St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church, for Mr. Charles Frederick BRIND, retired grocer, of 58 West Street, Ryde, whose sudden death took place at his home the previous Sunday. Interment was at Ryde Cemetery.

Mr. BRIND, who was 56, was a native of Ryde and had spent almost his entire life here. During World War 1 he saw service in France and Egypt with the R.A.M.C. He entered the bakery and grocery business of his father, Mr. Lewis BRIND, in the High Street as a youth, and eventually took it over from

him in 1919, retiring just over a year ago. He was a member of the Roman Catholic Church and also of the I.W. Grocers' Council.

Mourners were Miss N. OSBORNE (niece, representing Mrs. F. OSBORNE, sister), Miss H. BRIND (cousin), Mr. E. WILSON-CHALON (cousin). Mr. F. CHIVERTON (director of Messrs. UPWARD and RICH, representing the firm), and Mr. E. W. JOLLIFFE (representing Mr. H. M. WAVELL, president of the I.W. Grocers' Council) were also present. Mr. L. L. BRIND (brother) and Miss K. BRIND (sister) ran into a snowdrift on Mersley Downs and were prevented from attending.
