DEATH OF MR. C. V. DRAWBRIDGE

The death occurred rather suddenly on Thursday week, at Woodlands, Quarr-road, of Mr. **Charles Vaughan DRAWBRIDGE**, people's warden at the Parish Church. He was born in Scarborough, the son of a local solicitor. A sculptor by profession, he was a pupil of the distinguished craftsman Capt. Adrian JONES, and assisted in the execution of the magnificient bronze known as the Quadriga, which was presented to King Edward V11 and stands at Hyde Park Corner. He did much fine work in marble.

In the last war he served with the London Scottish Regt., and was in action at Messines. He was afterwards a gunnery instructor at Winchester and Hayling Island, and came to Binstead on retirement in 1926.

He was a member of the committee of the Conservative Association, and took a leading part in connection with the old Rifle Club. A musician of considerable ability, he played the 'cello and was an orchestral member of Ryde Philharmonic Society.

The deepest sympathy is felt with his sister, Miss Maud DRAWBRIDGE, with whom he had lived for many years.

The Rev. C. HEALD conducted the funeral service at the Parish Church on Monday. The coffin was covered with the Union Jack. The mourners were Miss DRAWBRIDGE (sister) and Mr. C. B. DRAWBRIDGE (nephew). Several friends and representatives of the church and Conservative Association were present.

The beautiful flowers included those from the Rector and Church Council, and the interment was at the cemetery in the grave lined with evergreens and spring flowers.
