ALL HOPE ABANDONED.—A Central News messge states that practically all hope is abanoned in British Columbia for safety of missing British sloop Condor.

The Admiralty suggested in a statement issued last night that an accident might have happened to the Condor's machinery and delayed her arrival at Honolulu. Nothing has been heard of her since he departure from Esquimault on December 2^{nd} ,

The Navy department at Washington, according to a Central News telegram, has at the request of the British Admiralty ordered the cutter McCullock now at San Fransisco to join in the search for the missing vessel.

THE MISSING CONDOR.—No further news had been received yesterday of H.M.S. Condor, which left Esquimault on December 2nd, and it is now suggested that the missing vessel and a collier, also long overdue, have been lost in a collision.

The cruiser Phaeton, which sailed from Esquimault to follow the probable track of H.M.S. Condor, has arrived at San Francisco, bringing no news of the missing vessel. The search is being continued.

The Admiralty announces with regret that all hope of the Condor being afloat must now be abandoned, and express deep sympathy with the relatives and friends of those who were on board, and with the nation generally at the loss of one of his Majesty's ships and of so many valuable lives.

The Admiralty has issued a nominal list of officers and men of the ill-fated Condor, believed to have been lost off the coast of Vancouver. The list comprises 8 officers, 85 men, and 11 Marines.
