**DEATH OF MRS. H. JAMES.-** It is with regret that we record the death of Mrs. Annie JAMES, wife of Mr. Henry JAMES, of Glenroy, which occurred on Friday of last week, at the age of 53, following a long illness. Mrs. JAMES had recently undergone an operation, her condition growing gradually worse until the end came peacefully. The deceased came of a highly respected family and was held in great esteem, especially by those connected with the Wesleyan Church. Her many kindnesses and ever-ready help to the Wesleyan cause will long live in the memory of those who knew and loved her. Widespread sympathy is felt with the husband, son, and daughter in their sad loss.

The funeral took place on Monday at the Wesleyan Church, the Rev. F. F. HAWKEY officiating, assisted by the Rev. Arthur TRIGGS and the Rev. T. G. PHILLIPS. The church was full. The hymns "How sweet the name of Jesus sounds" and "Jesu, Lover of my soul," were sung. The Rev. A. TRIGGS spoke of the heavy loss felt at Mrs. JAMES's death and expressed deep sympathy with those who felt the loss most keenly; those in the home that she had done so much to make a haven of peace, fellowship and love. Her life touched very many, and the measure of the gap made by her departure and the widespread sense of loss were a measure of the greatness of her soul. She always had a very humble and modest idea of her own powers, but she rendered most valuable help and her influence for good was great and would abide. Those who came into touch with her learned to honour, admire, and love her; she was a peacemaker and a good example to all; she was one of "God's poems," known and read. An outstanding feature of her character was gentleness mingled with strength, her patience was wonderful, she was cheerful even in the midst of her suffering. As the cortege left the church, Mr. TOPP, of Ryde, at the organ, played "For all the saints." The body was conveyed to the Binstead Cemetery by Mr. H. JAMES's building and farm staff. The interment ceremony was performed by the Rev. F. F. HAWKEY.
