DEATH OF MRS ARTHUR LEES

It is with deep regret we have to record the death of this esteemed lady, who only less than four weeks ago, became the bride of Captain LEES, second son of Sir John LEES, Baronet. The sad event occurred at Beachlands, early on the morning of Thursday, the 10th inst. We need scarcely say that this announcement has cast a deep feeling of gloom all over the town and neighbourhood, where both the deceased and the family to which she had so recently been united, are so well known and universally respected. The the death of Mrs LEES was totally unexpected by her nearest relatives and friends may be gathered from the fact that on Wednesday night Mrs SULIVAN, the mother of Lady LEES, gave the usual annual servants' ball at Beachlands, to which a large party had been invited, and it was actually at the very same time that a party of 100 revellers were in the

height of their enjoyment in one portion of the building, that the family upstairs were summoned to the bedside of the dying bride. Of course the party was immediately broken up. At three o'clock Mrs SULIVAN requested her guests to depart as quietly as possible. Before five o'clock Mrs LEES had breathed her last. Diptheria, was, we understand, the immediate cause of death, the lady having taken a severe cold whilst riding to Cowes to see the American yachts soon after their arrival. Another circumstance which makes this event still more distressing is, that at the time of Mrs LEES' death her husband was away for the purpose of obtaining an extension of leave of absence from his regiment, now stationed at Malta, where it was his intention to proceed in company with his wife, so soon as her health enabled her to undertake the journey.
