We have to record the death of Mrs. **MCDONNELL**, who for many years carried on business in the High-street, Ryde. Mrs. **MCDONNELL** was one of the most genial and kindly of women, and the older generation of Ryders who knew her will hear with regret that she has passed away.

Mrs. **MCDONNELL** was buried on Thursday, when, following the beautiful custom long established at St. Marie's, a Requiem Mass was sung in the church. The Right Rev. Monsignor CAHILL V.G., performed the last rites at the graveside over the remains of one of the oldest

members of his congregation.

Amongst the beautiful flowers sent by relatives and friends was a magnificent harp (with broken strings) bearing the following inscription "From the Irish Nationalists of Southampton with affectionate sympathy (and then in Celtic) May her Soul rest in the hand of God---(signed) Dr. W. P. O'MEARA, president, John MOSS, Secretary."
