NONAGENARIAN'S DEATH.- A link with the Island of bygone days was severed on Tuesday by the death at 2 Hillview-cottages, Newport-road, of Mr. Charles QUELCH, who was within a fortnight of celebrating his 90th birthday. The deceased, who had spent most of his long life in the Island, as a lad lived at Bembridge, where his mother was housekeeper to the late Canon LE MESURIER. Deceased was educated at the Freshwater National School, where he was a boarder. The late Mr. QUELCH was for many years in business as a cabinet maker and upholsterer in Ryde, and lived in Winton-street. He removed to Southampton, where he lived for 11 years, and for the last few years had resided in Cowes. Since his wife's death in 1910 he had been cared for by his unmarried daughter. Deceased who had a wonderful knowledge of Island history during the last century, was the oldest member of the Bembridge branch of the Hants Friendly Society. He enjoyed splendid health until a few months ago. In October, 1930, he suffered a heavy bereavement by the death of his only son (Capt. H. C. QUELCH, a former commander in the Royal Mail Steampacket Company who served with distinction in the war, and afterwards was proprietor of the Alliance Hotel, Oxford-street, Southampton), of whom he was very proud.

The interment took place at Ryde Cemetery yesterday (Friday), the Rev. A. W. H. HARLOW officiating. The family mourners were Miss QUELCH (daughter), Mr. Darro QUELCH (grandson), and Mrs. H. C. QUELCH (daughter-in-law).
