THE LATE MR. E. RANDOLPH, M.A.- The funeral of Mr. Edmund RANDOLPH, M.A., of St. Vincent's Villa, Barfield (whose death we recorded last week), took place on Tuesday morning. The coffin, which was of polished oak, with handsome brass mountings, was taken to St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church on Monday evening, when the office of the church and a dirge were chanted. The body remained in the church till the following morning, when the Requiem Mass was sung, after which the mournful cortege wended its way to the Cemetery. The three sons of the deceased gentlemen were the chief mourners, and many members of the congregation attended. The procession was met at the gate of the Cemetery by the Right Rev. Monsignor CAHILL and the acolytes, and the last sad rites were performed with much solemnity. As the body was lowered into the grave, the Benedictus was chanted and prayers recited. A number of wreaths and floral emblems of affection were placed on the coffin.- Mr. RANDOLPH (who has resided in Ryde about thirty years) was, at one time, a clergyman of the Church of England. He was the youngest son of the late Rev. Herbert RANDOLPH, rector of Letcombe, Basset,

Berks, where he was born in 1821. In 1840, he was entered at Jesus College, Cambridge, where he graduated in 1844. In 1846 he gained the Tyrwhitt (Hebrew) scholarship of the 1st class, and took Anglican Orders. He was appointed in 1846, Vicar of St. Clements, Cambridge. This living he resigned on his marriage, in 1849 to Georgiana Harriett 4th daughter of Col. SHERLOCK, K.H., 4th Dragoon Guards, and shortly after took the curacy of Little Hadham, Herts. He gave up this position in 1856, and in the following year was received by the Rev. John TELFORD, of St. Mary's, Ryde, I.W., into the communion of the Catholic Church, of which he always remained a faithful son. Mr. RANDOLPH was a sound Biblical and Oriental scholar, as well as an accurate student of the classical and modern languages. He led a retired life, and more especially through failing health the last few years. His collection of Oriental and Theological works is bequeathed to the Benedictines Community of Belmont.

MR. EDMUND RANDOLPH.- who died at his residence, St. Vincent's Villa, last week, was an old and highly respected inhabitant He was the youngest son of the late Rev. Herbert RANDOLPH, rector of Letcombe-Bassett, Berks, where he was born in 1821. In 1840 he entered Jesus College, Cambridge, where he graduated in 1844, a period at which religious questions were engaging the attention of the best minds of both Universities. He interested himself in the well-known Cambridge Camden Society for the revival of ritual and church architecture. in 1846 he gained the Tyrwhitt (Hebrew) scholarship in the first and took Anglican orders. Next year he proceeded to his M.A. degree. After a short period at St. Nicholas, Colchester, he was, in 1846, appointed vicar of St. Clements, Cambridge, which living he resigned on his marriage in 1849. Later on he took the curacy of Little Hadham, Herts, which he resigned in 1856. In the following year he was received into the Catholic Church by Rev. J. TELFORD, of St. Mary's, Ryde. He remained a member of his college till his death. Mr. RANDOLPH was a sound Biblical and Oriental scholar, as well as an accurate student of classical and modern languages. These and kindred studies formed his favourite pursuits, and together with his researches in Catholic antiquity, brought him into contact with a number of eminent men both in England and on the Continent. He led a somewhat retired life, especially, owing to failing health, during the last few years. His valuable collection of Oriental and theological works is bequeathed to the Benedictine community at Belmont. His funeral took place at the Cemetery on Tuesday. A dirge was sung on the previous evening at St. Mary's, followed on the morning of the interment by a requiem. As usual the Benedictus was sung at the grave. Monsignor CAHILL officiated, assisted by the Rev. Father WYNDER.
