DEATH OF MR. O.F. SALTER.

The death took place on Wednesday of Mr. **Oliver Frank SALTER**, of Nelson Villa, Nelson Place. Mr. SALTER, who was 84 years of age, passed away after having been in failing health for some months. A native of the borough, deceased will be especially well remembered by the older inhabitants.

In earlier years, with his brothers, he assisted their father in the management of the old Belgrave Hotel, which was formerly at the bottom of Nelson-STREET. The Castle Hotel, Carisbrooke, and the Old Queen's Hotel (now the Marine Hotel), of Ventnor, were also managed by the family. SALTERs were also noted for their catering arrangements on the steamboat services of those days. The old Belgrave Hotel was a coaching hostelry, and the SALTER family ran their own four-in-hands. When the hotel was pulled down, Mr. SALTER obtained the position of head carver at the House of Commons, a position he held for some years until he returned to the town. He was then employed at the Royal Pier Hotel for some years under Mr. PUTTICK's management, having charge of the silver. He retired several years prior to the demolition of this familiar landmark. A man of a very amiable and kindly disposition, he was held in high regard by everyone with whom he was brought into contact.

He was one of a family of 13, and had survived his one sister and 11 brothers. His wife predeceased him about five years ago. There are four daughters left to mourn the loss of a very fond and devoted father. The funeral takes place this (Saturday) morning.
