**SAD DEATH.**---We are sorry to record the death of **Charles TAYLOR** (whose real name is, however, JONES), a son-in-law of Mr. TAYLOR, the well-known postmaster, of Monkton-

street. The deceased (whose long connection with the coaches had made him very well known amongst those whose avocations take them to the Esplanade) was first missed on Friday last. It was, however, supposed he had gone away on a visit. As no tidings could be obtained of him, his brother, Mr. William TAYLOR, decided on Wednesday afternoon to break into the residence of the deceased, at Dunstons, and there deceased was found lying dead in his bed. The medical opinion seems to be that he had been dead at least since Friday, and that an apoplectic fit was the cause of death. The Coroner had not considered it necessary to hold an inquest. Deceased was about 48 years of age.
