DEATH OF MR. J. TOMS.- The death of Mr. Joseph TOMS, of Lychett Villa, Pellhurstroad, has removed from our midst a thorough churchman and one who greatly interested himself in the necessitous poor. He had been in indifferent health or a long time, but had only been obliged to keep to his bed for six weeks. He died on Friday in last week, aged 64 years. Mr. TOMS lived at Croydon for many years, but came to live at Ryde about two decades ago. He lived a retired life, but soon identified himself with many societies, especially those connected with the Church. Perhaps he will best be remembered as the assistant hon, treasurer for the Island branch of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Families Association, in connection with which he did much valuable work locally. he was also hon. secretary of the Ryde Relief Society and of the managers of Ryde C.E. Schools, and was associated with the National Society and the Bishop of Winchester's Fund in the Island. He was a regular worshipper at the Parish-church and a devoted worker. Among the many church societies he was connected with was the Church of England Men's Society. He had very many friends in the town. He leaves a widow and an only son, Mr. A. Maurice TOMS, who, within a few weeks of war breaking out, went out to India with the 6th Hants. Many will remember Mr. A. M. TOMS as an enthusiastic worker in the anti-vivisection movement. He has spoken with great with great ability in favour of anti-vivisection in many parts of the Island and of the mainland.

The funeral took place on Tuesday, the first part of the service being held at the Parishchurch, the Vicar (the Rev. Hugh LE FLEMING) and the Rev. G. L. DAVEY (rector of Binstead) officiating. The service was read by the Vicar and the Rev. G. L. DAVEY read the lesson. The mourners were the widow, Mr. John A. TOMS and the Rev. A. A. TOMS, vicar of Flixton, Suffolk (brothers), Miss H. B. TOMS (sister), Mr. W. N. ROWLAND (brother-in-law), Miss ROWLAND,

Miss G. ROWLAND, and Miss I. ROWLAND. Among those at the church were Col. E. W. CRADOCK, J.P., Dr. J. WOODRUFF (Binstead), the Rev. Viscount and Lady MOUNTMORRES, the Rev. R. B. DURRANT, the Rev. W. F. J. HANBURY (vicar of St. Michael and All Angels, Swanmore), Major J. ELLEREY, and Messrs. Walter HILLS, J. E. BREBNER, E. C. LOADER, A. F. WAY, A. PIGON, Maurice RIDDETT, G. READ, R. HENDERSON, and G. BENNETT. There were some choice floral tributes.
