WARREN.- William George Frederick, of 6 Arthur-street, Ryde, entered into life April 21, 1938, aged 62 years.- Funeral St. James's Church to-day (Saturday), 1.50.

MR. W. G. F. WARREN

For over 40 years a popular and respected resident of Ryde. Mr. William George Frederick WARREN passed away after a long illness at his home, 6 Arthur Street, Ryde, on Thursday at the age of 62.

He was employed as a railway carrier by Messrs. CHAPLINS and Messrs. PICKFORDS, and his cheerful personality was known to the majority of residents, and particularly to the business section of the town with whom he had almost daily contact during the entire 40 years of his working life here. He was a well-known member of the Foresters and was a staunch member of St. James's Church. For many years he was a sidesman, and was deeply interested in every department of church work. A widow, three sons and two daughters are left, and sincere sympathy is extended to them in their sad loss. With the exception of the eldest son, Mr. Reginald WARREN, who is in the Navy and stationed at Portsmouth, the family reside in the town.

The funeral at St. James's Church on Saturday was conducted by the Rev. H. B. WORTHINGTON (incumbent of St. Thomas' Church), and the service was choral. The organist, Mr. H. LOWER, accompanied the hymns "Like a river glorious" and "Till he come." The 23rd Psalm was chanted, and the lesson was Revelations 21 was read by the lay reader, Mr. J. W. MITCHELL. Present in the congregation were several members of the Court Astraea, Ancient Order of Foresters, and employees of Messrs PICKFORDS and CHAPLINS, the latter including Mr. D. J. EVANS (manager of Messrs. CHAPLINS Ryde Office), Mr. G. EMERY (formerly manager of Messrs. CHAPLINS Ryde Office.), Messrs. C. CRABB, F. COLLISS, H. PERKIS, C. BARTLETT and E. GAWN.

As the cortege left the church the organist played "O rest in the Lord."

The chief mourners were the widow, Mrs. W. WARREN, Messrs. Reginald, Ronald and Leslie WARREN (sons), Mrs. G. M. PALMER and Miss F. WARREN (daughters), Mr. E. PALMER (son-in-law), Mr. W. T. WARREN (brother), Mrs. Cecelia BROWN (sister), Mr. C. FRAMPTON, of Newport, Mr. F. SCOVELL (brothers-in-law) and Mr. A. WARREN (nephew).
