DEATH OF MRS. H WILLSTEED. – The death occurred at 63, St. John's-road of Mrs. Maria WILLSTEED, wife of Mr. Henry WILLSTEED. Deceased, who was 75 years of age had been ill for a considerable period and passed peacefully away on Saturday. Previous to her illness Mrs. WILLSTEED was a keen worker for the United Methodist Church.

The funeral took place yesterday (Friday), the interment at the Cemetery being preceded by a service at the U.M. Church. The Revs. H. PARSONS (Ventnor) and G. OSBORNE officiated. The hymns "Jesu, lover of my soul" and "Rock of ages" were sung. The mourners were the husband, Messrs. E. and A. WILLSTEED (sons), Mesdames MORRIS, FAIRCLOTH, and ALLEN (daughters), Messrs. E. MORRIS, A. FAIRCLOTH and A. ALLEN (sons-in-law), Messrs. E. WILLSTEED and E. JACKSON (brothers-in-law), Miss K. WILLSTEED (sister-in-law), Miss ALLEN (niece), and Miss MERWOOD. Others present were Mr. and Mrs. S. FLIPPANCE, Messrs. DALLIMORE, H.P. TAYLOR, NICHOLLS, R. BATCHELOR and L. ALLEN, Mesdames G. OSBORNE, LAKE, MERWOOD, and Miss SOTHCOTT. The remains were contained in an unpolished elm coffin. Among the wreaths was a token from the members of the United Reform Church.
