DEATH OF MRS. YARD

Our obituary this week contains the name of a very much respected lady, Mrs. Alleyne **YARD**. For many years the deceased lady resided at Buckland Grange, but for some time past she has been living at No. 4 Sydney Terrace, where she died. Mrs. YARD had the reputation of being one of the most kindly and sympathetic of our residents. No case deserving of relief ever appealed to her in vain. Quiet and unostentatious in her style of living, she delighted in being the almoner of her own bounty, as long as her health permitted her to do so. So unobtrusive and so kindly was her charity that very few, even of her most intimate friends, knew about it. As an instance of her generosity, we may state that only last year, when she heard that the Ryde Relief Society was in want of blankets, she at once sent a donation of £20, and doubled her subscription. No doubt many of the poor in the town have benefited during the present winter by that generous action.

The funeral took place at Binstead Cemetery, on Thursday morning. The coffin, which was of polished oak with brass mountings, was conveyed in an open catafalque to the cemetery, where the funeral service was performed by the Rev. G. V. GARLAND (Rector of Binstead), and the Rev. R. HOSGOOD.
