## RYDE CEMETERY RESTORATION PROJECT

In September 2010 the Isle of Wight Council successfully completed a three year Heritage Lottery funded project to restore Ryde Cemetery. During the course of the Project the three Chapels were restored and a toilet was installed in the Bothey. The West Street gates were replaced and new seating and sign boards were installed. All this work was done with the aim of restoring parts of the Cemetery to their former Victorian glory. The Project delivered some high quality training opportunities to the community on Natural History, Conservation and Traditional Craft Skills. A dedicated Sexton/Cemetery Warden has now been employed to ensure the continued maintenance of the Cemetery. Several important graves and vaults have been restored after suffering deterioration over the years.

The most significant outcome of the Restoration Project has been the creation of the Heritage and Learning Resource Centre in the North Chapel. The Centre is equipped with a suite of computers and resources relating to the history of Ryde and the people buried in the Cemetery, all of which are available for members of the community and school groups to use.

From 1842 to the presnt day Ryde Cemetery continues to be a valuable asset to the people of Ryde and descendents of the people buried there.
