He also went with the relief party to Kut, and on the way thither was promoted to corporal, then to sergeant. At Charaban he met with his brother, Gnr. Dick WHITE, R. F. A., whom he had not seen for nearly seven years. The brothers spent the night together there, sleeping under a wagon. Sergt. WHITE walking the six miles back in the morning to rejoin his regiment, a tramp he doubtless regarded as a very small payment for the pleasure the meeting afforded him. He likewise had the gratification of greeting three other brothers on Sunday, who were fortunately able to get home to meet him. Sergt. WHITE was formerly a popular member of the Seaview Football Club, and before leaving for India, was presented with a gold medal as a mark of the esteem and appreciation of his fellow members. He is now enjoying a month's leave before going again to face the foe. It is notable that during the period of his absence, Sergt. WHITE has not had a day's sickness.
