Death of Mrs. A. E. MACLEOD-CAREY. - The death took place at Kelso, Spencer Road, on Tuesday, of Mrs. **Beatrice Annie MACLEOD-CAREY**, wife of Mr. A. E. MACLEOD-CAREY. Mrs. MACLEOD-CAREY was born at Merthyr Tydvil, South Wales, and came to the Island several years ago. She took a keen interest in local activities, and until ill-health intervened was an energetic member of the All Saints' Parochial Church Council, the local branch committee of the Conservative Association, the British Legion Women's Section, and the Townswomen's Guild. She leaves one son, Lieut.-Col. C. C. M. MACLEOD-CAREY, R.A. (retd.). She was a Red Cross worker during the first world war. In 1948 Mr. and Mrs. MACLEOD-CAREY celebrated their golden wedding. The Vicar (Canon A. CORY, R.D.) officiated at the funeral at All Saints' Church yesterday. Mr. W. L. REED (organist) accompanied the singing of "There is a land of pure delight."
