DEATH OF MR. JACKMAN. – We regret to announce the death of **Mr. Charles William JACKMAN**, a very old and respected resident of Ryde, who passed away at Clarence House, Nelson Street, on Tuesday morning, aged 75. The deceased, who was a very active man for his age, was about as usual until a fortnight ago when he caught a chill which was followed by influenza and double pneumonia to which he succumbed. He was in business for many years as a tailor and outfitter and was one of the oldest tradesmen in High Street. He leaves a widow, who is an invalid, and a grown-up family of seven sons and daughters. In 1914 when his son-in-law the late Major A. J. HARTNALL joined up, Mr. JACKMAN took over the business of the Observer Press in the Colonnade, Lind Street, which he managed until it was purchased by the present Proprietor.

The mourners comprised Messrs. C. W. JACKMAN (Farnham), H. W. JACKSON (Woolwich), and A. J. JACKMAN (Southampton), sons; Mr. Benjamin ROACH (brother-in-law), Mr. A. GIBSON, and Mr. J. B. PURNELL. Others present in the church or at the grave-side were the Mayor (Alderman W. H. P. THIRKELL), Councillor H. B. JOLLIFFE, Mr. A. E. LOWE, Mr. A. MILLER, and Mr J. COOPER. The Rev. The Hon, Ivor FIENNES, M.A. (Vicar of Holy Trinity) officiated, acting for the Vicar of Ryde. There were no flowers by request and the coffin of polished elm, was inscribed "Charles William JACKMAN, Died March 16th 1920, aged 75 years."

The funeral arrangements were carried out by Messrs. PURNELL and PURNELL under the personal superintendence of Mr. A. G. PURNELL.
