

Former Postman's Death.- The death occurred on Friday week of **Mr. Harry Alfred LANGDON**, a retired postman, of 38 Argyll Street. He was 80. He joined the Post Office as a telegraph boy, but left to serve with the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. After seven years in India he served throughout the Boer war, and on completion of his military service in 1903 with the rank of corporal he returned to work in the Post Office, and was awarded the Imperial Service Medal. He was a member of the South African Wars Veterans' Association and the British Legion, a former member of the Town Club, and had been a keen supporter of the Football Club. He leaves a son and daughter, Mrs. LANGDON having died in 1944.

The funeral took place on Monday, the service at All Saints' Church being conducted by the Rev. P. L. VAUGHAN. The mourners were Mr. H. A. LANGDON and Miss E. LANGDON (son and daughter), Mr. and Mrs. E. A. LANGDON (brother and sister-in-law), Mesdames E. REEVES, E. M. MEW, and A. BATTEN (sisters), Miss H. REEVES (niece) and Mr. H. COLLYER (representing Messrs. James ELDRIDGE and Sons). Mr. W. GOUGH (deputy postmaster) represented Mr. E. J. COHU (postmaster), Mr. C. A KING (hon. secretary), the Federation of Post Office Veterans' Associations, and Mr. W. MICHIE (former colleagues). The interment was at Ryde Cemetery and the wreaths included one from the Post Office Veterans' Association.
