

FUNERAL OF A VOLUNTEER. - On Friday evening last the body of **Private F.W. HUNT**, of B company, whose death was recorded in the obituary of our last issue, was interred in the Cemetery with full military honours. The detachment paraded at 6.30, there being a good muster, all the officers being present. They proceeded to the residence of the deceased in George-street, from whence the coffin was conveyed by eight pall bearers. The coffin was covered with the Union Jack and several beautiful wreaths. The helmet and side arms of the deceased were also placed upon it. The coffin was preceded by the band of the detachment, who played the dead march in "Saul," and was followed by the firing party, 13 in number, in charge of Sergt. GRIFFIN, with reversed arms, and the other members of the detachment. They proceeded up George-street, through George-street, down High-street, and along John-street to the Parish Church, where the mournful procession was met by the Vicar and the coffin taken inside the church, where the first part of the burial service was read by the Vicar. They then proceeded to the Cemetery, the band again playing the dead march. After the service at the grave (which was also performed by the Vicar) the firing party fired three volleys into the air. The ceremony excited the deepest interest, and was witnessed by several thousands of spectators.
